Lieutenant Adeel Rana immigrated to the United States in the late 1980's with his family from Pakistan. He was always eager to help others and stay involved in the community. He started to volunteer his time with the Pakistan Community Center and help with events such as parades and festivals. In 1995 Lt. Rana joined the New York City Auxiliary Police Department to assist his community. He performed over 5,000 hours of volunteer service and rose through the ranks to be commanding officer of Special Events Unit in the Patrol Borough Brooklyn South. As an Auxiliary Officer he was not only active in assisting the community and recruiting Muslims into the program, he was also an active crime fighter. Lt. Rana assisted in numerous essential arrests including a serial armed robber who preyed on gas stations, a group who fatally stabbed and robbed a young victim, and also caught a murderer fleeing the scene of the crime. He received numerous Auxiliary of the month awards for his service.

- Lt. Rana joined the U.S. Army in 1998 as a M1A1 Tanker. After his father passed away in 1998 he accepted the responsibility of taking care of his family and pursued his dreams of becoming a Police Officer. Officer Rana began working full time while simultaneously attending school full time as well as continuing to volunteer with the Police Department and remain active in the New York Army National Guard. He was called to duty on September 11, 2001. He served 90 days in and around ground zero, assisting with recovery and security of the city.
- Lt. Rana became a Police Officer in 2004 and entered the Police Academy where he was appointed as his Company Sergeant. In this prestigious role it was his responsibility to assist and guide his fellow recruits through the academy until graduation. After graduation he was assigned to the 61st Precinct where, due to his dedication, hard work, knowledge, and experience, he was soon awarded a position in an elite precinct unit by his commanding officer. As an Assistant Field Intelligence Officer he and his team closed out numerous felony crime patterns and executed many arrests for firearms and narcotics. This purge included a search warrant that resulted in the discovery of 25 guns, including machine guns, as well as another search warrant resulting in the largest fireworks seizure in the history of New York City: 9,000 pounds of fireworks. He received numerous COP of the Month awards as well as an American Legion Award for his work. He also volunteered his time to run the NYPD Explorer program for the 61st Precinct.
- Lt. Rana joined the Community Affairs Bureau in October of 2007 as a liaison to the South Asian Community due to his dedication towards his community and his ability to communicate in multiple languages. During his first few months assigned to the Community Affairs Bureau, he made two arrests for grand larceny, totaling 156 arrests in his career. As a South Asian Liaison with the Community Affairs Bureau, he assisted in bridging the gap between the community and NYPD. He had a big hand in establishing and recruiting members into the NYPD Cricket for youths 19 years of age and under, which began in 2008 and has continued to be a success with the youths in the community.

In 2009 Lt. Rana was promoted to Sergeant and was assigned to the 72nd Precinct in Brooklyn South. His promotion, transfer and new assignment didn't keep him from his continued efforts in assisting his community. He kept his contacts and performed community service after work, including holding a Health Fair for Women. Within 4 months he was assigned to the Anti-Crime / Burglary Apprehension Team and Street Narcotics Enforcement Team Supervisor for his

integrity, dedication and hard work. In 2010 Lt. Rana was transferred back to Community Affairs Bureau to continue his work with the community, especially with the youth and his involvement with the creation of NYPD Youth Cricket and Soccer Leagues.

In 2013 Lt. Rana was promoted to Lieutenant and served in Transit Bureau Queens as the Operations Coordinator; In 2014 Lt. Rana was assigned as the commanding officer of the NYPD Community Affairs Immigrant Outreach Unit. The Unit was established to create and grow relationships between the new immigrant communities and the NYPD. These relationships build trust and establish communication which helps the NYPD serve the community and keep the city safe. He currently directs and supervises a unit of Immigrant Liaisons representing the Arab/Muslim, Hispanic, African/Caribbean, Asian, South Asian & Eastern European new immigrant communities in NYC. These liaisons work closely with immigrant community leaders to provide important safety tips and obtain information about issues which may be affecting the community. Most recently the unit concentrated on informing new immigrants about the Green Dot Money Pack Scam which targeted new immigrants with fake threatening phone calls to defraud them of their money. The unit also works closely with other agencies like the Manhattan D.A. Immigrant Fraud Unit, Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs, Queens Borough Presidents, Immigrant Task Force and many other Non Profit service providers and government agencies to concentrate on helping address any safety issues concerning the new immigrant community. Lt. Rana led a United States State Department exchange program to Pakistan. The program highlighted the NYPD's Community Outreach efforts, Crime fighting techniques, roles Muslim Americans play in NYPD and the USA's society among other things. The presentations and exchanges were conducted with university and high school students and also with the High Ranking Pakistani Police Officials from Islamabad, Lahore and Karachi

Lt. Rana is currently the President of the Muslim Officers Society. This fraternal organization is the first one ever established in the United States representing Muslim Officers. The Organization was formed in 2006 to provide mutual advancement in the best interest of its members, through friendly and fraternal cooperation. To promote patriotism and encourage the demonstration of respect and honor among Muslims in law enforcement who have contributed to the building and preservation of the United States of America. The Muslim Officers Society is open to all members of the service both Civilian and uniform. The society is also actively involved in conducting community outreach, offering assistance and strengthening relations between law enforcement and the community.

Lieutenant Adeel Rana hold a Bachelor's in Management from Baruch College. He is married with 2 beautiful children ages 5 and 2.
